

## Whooping Cough

As you would be well aware, we have had a spate of Whooping Cough cases diagnosed over the last 6 weeks. We have sent our families notes and fact sheets multiple times via electronic and physical means in order to inform and hopefully empower you to prevent this occurrence for your child.

Please use this information to help halt the transmission of this disease.

At this stage, at the first sign of one of these symptoms on the fact sheet, the health department and other medical professionals have advised parents to keep children away from others and have the swab test. Children should remain away from others whilst awaiting results.

## School Payments

Please ensure that payments are made into the correct accounts i.e. School Account or MPS P&C Account.

**School events** are usually associated with excursions, incursions or course payments, Cash, cheque or POP payments made online through the website can be used for school payments.

**P&C events** like Meal Deals, Monster Fest, Easter Raffle, Disco etc–must be paid separate to school accounts. They can be made through cash, cheque or online direct debit payments via the P&C account.

No POP payments can be accepted for P&C events.

**SRC event payments** are also kept separate from the school's account. These payments need to be cash only. The school then banks the money at the appropriate time.

*Please check payment details carefully on the note for which account needs the money deposited.*

### K-2 Excursion to Hawkesbury Museum

K-2 had a very enjoyable day exploring artefacts and treasures from the 1800s and 1900s. Students split into their grade groups and participated in 3 activities over the course of the day.

#### Howe House

The Howe family lived in this house from the early 1800s. We dressed for the occasion – boys in vests and girls in long aprons. We saw a special curved mirror on the wall of their drawing room, which helped to reflect sunlight around the room... greatly needed since there was no electricity!

They still have the original tea box on display, which was always kept locked, since tea was so expensive to buy. Tea was such a treat, that the housekeeper wore the key around her neck at all times, and it was general only offered to important guests who visited the house.

The bath tub was a very funny shape, and we learnt people only bathed once a week on a Saturday! The beds looked fairly uncomfortable and the mattresses used to be stuffed with horse hair... does anyone want to go back in time?!!!

#### Drawing and Observing

In Thompson's Square, students observed the changes that had taken place over time (from viewing an old photo). Some things looked the same; Howe House, the Doctor's house, the bridge and part of the square. We reflected on the many changes, added verandah and doors to Howe House, roads, trees, light posts (because we now have electricity!), shops, curbing, guttering, footpaths and so on.


#### Hawkesbury Museum

Students were given a photograph of a modern object, i.e. pen, mobile phone, shoes etc... and were asked to be detectives! Everyone explored the museum and found the olden day object which matched their picture. Some were easy... shoes, hats, boat, tools... as they haven't changed much over time. Others were very tricky... phone, swimming costume, petrol pump... as they have changed significantly over time.

We really enjoyed the day! We were lucky enough to have the sun shining during our lunch break in the square, and we loved our hot chip lunch from Windsor Seafood.

The museum staff complimented our children on their beautiful manners, great questions and wonderful behaviour. Well done Maraylya!













## Wellbeing and PBL (Positive Behaviour for Learning)

Our students have continued to maintain a positive atmosphere in the playground by reflecting on our three school rules/ key words.

Our current PBL Focus will be undertaken in a more flexible, needs based, format.

Staff will continue to analyse behaviour data to ascertain areas of need across the school.

Staff are continuing to follow-up on explicit lessons, involving students thinking about what safety, respect and responsibility looks like in particular areas of the school.

### **Students crossing the road.... hold a hand!**

Please remember to hold your child's hand to cross the road, particularly with younger students.

Neich Road, whilst relatively quiet, can be a dangerous crossing in the morning and afternoon, with some motorists ignoring our warning signs.

A student pedestrian accident would be a devastating way to learn this lesson for the sake of a couple of minutes it takes to walk students in or out of school. Thank you.

We recognise that there will always be small issues amongst students. Please encourage your child to talk to their teacher or principal if they have any concerns in regards to social interactions in the school.

If this is not appropriate, please make contact with the school as soon as possible so smaller issues can be attended to before becoming bigger.

# Developing your child's social media scripts

It's important to start conversations with children about using social media at a young age to prepare them to be savvy users when we're not around.

"If a job's worth doing, it's worth doing well."

This mantra always pops into mind whenever I'm about to cut some corners or do a rushed job in any endeavour. As a result I double-check every article I write for mistakes. I over prepare every talk I give. And I continually edit and re-edit my books. This message keeps me at the top of my game.

I can thank, or blame, my mother for inserting this mantra in my mind as she repeated it whenever I did a rushed job as a youngster making my bed, doing homework or cleaning up my bathroom mess.

Parents of every generation have always found ways to frame messages of safety and success for their children to remember. Parents of past generations who only had to contend with the offline or real world intuitively knew that they needed to teach child important lessons about safety and manners rather than assume they'll be understood.

The same maxim holds true for the world of social media that children now inhabit from an increasingly young age. Even though our children are growing up with technology as a part of their every day lives, they will still make plenty of mistakes while using it. This means we need to have direct conversations with our kids about the comments and posts that are okay to make using social media of all forms.

As parents we teach our kids to talk politely and clearly so that they know how to speak to others when we're not around. In effect, we give our kids social scripts to fall back on when they talk to friends, teachers and relatives. There's no guarantee they'll look an adult in the eye when they speak to them, but our discussions, reminders and lessons about manners will hopefully hold up when we're not around.

The same applies to social media. Our conversations and lessons will prepare them to be savvy users when we're not

around. Here are some ideas to get you started:

### 1 "Is this worth posting?"

The relatively impersonal nature of social media means that we can post information and pictures with relative immunity. Also its immediacy means that we can do so without much thought. This means that kids need to be very critical about what they see online. 'Is this accurate?' and 'Is this worth posting?' are two valid questions children can ask when they read posts placed by others.

### 2 "Have you taken a big breath?"

A child who blurts out everything that comes into his mind without thinking is sure to put plenty of people offside. 'Think before you speak' is the type of message that every child should have in mind.

The same applies to social media. Just because they think something doesn't mean they post it. 'Take a big breath' may just about be the most important message to give your kids about social media.

### 3 "Do you want the principal to see this?!"

An invitation to a teenage birthday party posted on social media is one way to get more attendees than you bargained for! The viral nature of social media means that kids should only post messages and photos that they want to be spread and read by a large audience.

### 4 "How does this post make you feel?"

We need to teach kids that not every post needs to be commented upon and not every thought needs to be shared, particularly when they are angry. Teaching them to walk away and then to step back in when they've calmed down is perhaps the most important communication lesson of all. It is very relevant to social media as emotions are often the last thing on many people's minds when they haphazardly post a message.

### 5 "How will you fix this?"

Social media just like any social space requires kids to behave ethically and with kindness. When kids overstep the mark and post hurtful things then it's fair that they fix their mistakes, and apologise. It's reasonable that we teach our children to act with tolerance and with empathy online, and if mean things are posted then they should be expected to try to repair relationships through social media, just as they should offline.

I agree with *Galit Breen* author of *Kindness Wins* who says that parents should have conversations with children around social media before they reach the teenage years. Starting these conversations when they are younger means that they are more open to our parenting opinions, as well as being a little more amenable to the messages of tolerance, kindness and empathy that we need to encourage.



# R.E.D. Reading

In K-2, our R.E.D reading folders are used. All students have been provided with a red folder – which is separate to a homework folder.

- Students can bring in their folder as many days a week as they choose... it's up to you – how much do you want to read?
- Teachers will then ask students to read the book they have been practising, and decide if this book needs a little more practice or can be swapped.
- Students have a 'punch' card and will earn a Star Award once their card has been filled.

## Why read 20 minutes at home?

If they start reading for 20 minutes per night in Kindergarten, by the end of 6th grade, Student A will have read for the equivalent of 60 school days, Student B will have read for 12 school days, and Student C will have read for 3.
